Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

For the six-month period ended June 30, 2023, the NBI Preferred Equity Income Fund's Investor Series units returned 0.00% compared to 0.15% for the Fund's benchmark, the S&P/TSX Preferred Share Index (CAD). Unlike the benchmark, the Fund's performance is calculated after fees and expenses. Please see the *Past Performance* section for the returns of all of the Fund's series, which may vary mainly because of fees and expenses.

The Fund's net asset value dropped by 12.51% over the period, from \$592.67 million as at December 31, 2022 to \$518.51 million as at June 30, 2023.

The decline stemmed mainly from net redemptions by unitholders of the Fund.

It was a strong start to the year for Canadian preferred shares. All structures rebounded significantly after experiencing tax-loss selling pressure in December. The combination of wide spreads, solid credit profiles, and increasing coupons should continue to attract interest from investors. However, the rally was short-lived. As economic data kept coming in stronger throughout February with no signs of inflation abating, bond yields kept moving higher and Canadian Preferred Shares weakened. Counterintuitively, higher rates are having a negative effect on preferred share valuations as credit spreads widened, anticipating a deeper recession because of a more restrictive monetary policy.

While equities rebounded during the second quarter, preferred shares maintained their downward momentum. The S&P Preferred Share index has now given back all the gains it had recorded early in 2023. Most recently the market was impacted by the release of the federal budget which included a measure to tax Canadian financial institutions' dividends from Canadian entities as business income. This has created question marks around the preferred share investor base and whether traditional institutional preferred investors would still want to invest in the asset class if they are taxed in the future. The trade-off between poor liquidity and favourable tax treatment historically was enough to keep these buyers engaged in the market. Now their future "enthusiastic" participation is being called into question. This is yet another headwind for a beaten-up asset class, which over time will require more attractive yields to attract any new marginal buyers.

Since the federal budget announcement at the end of March, we have seen another 3 consecutive monthly outflows in preferred share ETFs. June was the 17th consecutive month of negative fund flows, by far the longest streak since preferred share ETFs became prevalent in the 2014-2015 period.

The unbalanced supply and demand environment has continued to put pressure on credit spreads which screen historically wide, especially for Fixed Resets. We continue to look for better equilibrium before becoming more constructive and this could be delayed if financial institutions decide to reduce their exposure.

The S&P TSX Preferred Shares Index lost 0.15% on a total return basis in the first half of 2023. Floaters were the best performers (2.4%), followed by Fixed Resets (0.6%) and Perpetuals (0.6%) on a total return basis.

In this context, the Fund underperformed its benchmark for the period. Some of the positive contributors were the portfolio manager's selection within Fixed Resets, of which lower spread issues reacted positively to higher interest rates.

Recent Developments

Exposure to Fixed Perpetuals and Floaters decreased while the exposure to Fixed Resets and Cash was increased. This was a result of opportunistic transactions during the quarter. The fund manager saw better opportunities in Fixed Resets not do not currently reflect the benefit of higher interest rates.

Exposure to P1 and P2 was increased while that of P3 issuers decreased. Exposure to Utilities and telecommunications was increased, for the same reasons mentioned previously.

Following the sharp selloff, the outlook for preferred share returns has improved. With a positive rate backdrop, the setup is encouraging considering credit spreads have widened considerably since their lows. As macroeconomic risk dissipates (geopolitical conflicts, supply chain issues, inflation) the portfolio manager believes preferred shares offer attractive risk/reward potential at these levels. However, they are looking for the balance in supply and demand of preferred shares to improve before we become more constructive on the asset class.

The fund manager is comfortable holding an overweight in fixed-rate perpetuals as their fundamentals are strong: high spreads, limited and shrinking supply with sustained demand because of the relatively high after-tax yield compared to other fixed-income securities available in Canada. Holding a diversified mix of fixed-rate perpetuals and fixed-resets is essential while navigating an unpredictable interest rate environment. It acts as a natural hedge against fixed-rate perpetuals since they tend to outperform in a rising rate environment, while the latter should stand out when rates fall. With 5-year interest rates at their highest level since 2011, it is important to be cautious about pricing in too many interests rate hikes. The portfolio manager's approach to investing will continue to be based on 3 key pillars: quality, balance, and relative valuation.

On May 1, 2023, the Fund's independent review committee (the "IRC") was increased to four members when Stéphanie Raymond-Bougie was appointed as IRC member.

The Fund's risk level was modified from "low to medium" to "medium" during the year. This change aims to more accurately reflect the Fund's actual risk level.

Related Party Transactions

National Bank of Canada ("the Bank") and its affiliated companies' roles and responsibilities related to the Fund are as follows:

Trustee, Custodian, and Registrar

Natcan Trust Company ("NTC"), a direct or indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank, is the Fund's trustee. In this capacity, it is the legal owner of the Fund's investments.

NTC acts as registrar for the Fund's securities and the names of securityholders. NTC also acts as the Fund's custodian. The fees for NTC's custodial services are based on the standard rates in effect at NTC.

Agent for securities lending transactions

NTC acts as the agent for securities lending transactions acts on behalf of the Fund in administering securities lending transactions entered into by the Fund. NTC is an affiliate of the Manager.

Fund Manager

The Fund is managed by National Bank Investments Inc. ("NBII"), which is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank. Therefore, NBII provides or ensures the provision of all general management and administrative services required by the Fund's current operations, including investment consulting, the arrangement of brokerage contracts for the purchase and sale of the investment portfolio, bookkeeping and other administrative services required by the Fund.

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund other than its "Fund costs" (defined below) (the "variable operating expenses"), in exchange for the Fund's payment to the Manager of annual fixed-rate administration fees with respect to each series of the Fund.

The administration fees are equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of each series of the Fund, calculated and paid in the same manner as the Fund's management fees. The variable operating expenses payable by the Manager include, but are not limited to: transfer agency and recordkeeping costs; custodial costs; accounting and valuation fees; audit fees and legal fees; costs of preparing and distributing financial reports, simplified prospectuses, annual information forms, Fund Facts, continuous disclosure material and other securityholder communications; and costs of trustee services relating to registered tax plans, as applicable.

In addition to administration fees, the Fund shall also pay certain Fund costs, namely: taxes (including, but not limited to, GST/HST and income taxes); costs of compliance with any changes to existing governmental or regulatory requirements introduced after August 1, 2013; costs of compliance with any new governmental or regulatory requirements, including any new fees introduced after August 1, 2013; interest and borrowing costs; costs related to external services that were not commonly charged in the Canadian mutual fund industry as at August 1, 2013; Independent Review Committee costs, including compensation paid to IRC members, travel expenses, insurance premiums and costs associated with their continuing education; and variable operating expenses incurred outside of the normal course of business of the Fund.

The Manager may, from time to time and at its sole discretion, decide to absorb a portion of a series' management fees, administration fees or Fund costs.

As described under the heading *Management Fees*, the Fund pays annual management fees to NBII as consideration for its services.

Distribution and Dealer Compensation

NBII acts as principal distributor for the Fund. In this capacity, NBII buys, sells and swaps securities through Bank branches and the National Bank Investments Advisory Service in Canadian provinces and territories, and through external registered representatives. Fund securities are also offered by National Bank Financial Inc. (including its division National Bank Direct Brokerage), CABN Investments (a division of NBII) and other affiliated entities. Brokers may receive, depending on the distributed series, a monthly commission representing a percentage of the average daily value of the securities held by their clients.

Brokerage Fees

The Fund may pay broker's commissions at market rates to a corporation affiliated with NBII. The brokerage fees paid by the Fund for the period are as follows:

Holdings

As at June 30, 2023, National Bank Investments Inc. held 166.76 Fund securities for a value of \$1,484.12, which represented close to 0.0003% of the net asset value of the Fund at that date. Transactions between National Bank Investments Inc. and the Fund were carried out in the normal course of business and at the Fund's net asset value as at the transaction date.

As at June 30, 2023, Intact Insurance Company held 23,640,904.00 Fund securities for a value of \$210,404,045.63, which represented close to 40.6100% of the net asset value of the Fund at that date. Transactions between Intact Insurance Company and the Fund were carried out in the normal course of business and at the Fund's net asset value as at the transaction date.

Independent Review Committee Approvals and Recommendations

The Fund followed the standing instructions of its Independent Review Committee with respect to one or more of the following transactions:

- a) Purchasing or holding the securities of a related issuer, in particular, those of National Bank of Canada;
- Investing in the securities of an issuer when an entity related to the manager acts as an underwriter for the placement or at any time during the 6o-day period after the end of the placement;
- Purchasing or selling securities to another investment Fund managed by the manager or a company in the same group;
- d) Purchasing or selling debt securities on the secondary market, through related brokers that are main brokers in the Canadian debt securities market (in accordance with an exemption received from the Canadian Securities Administrators):
- e) Entering into foreign exchange transactions (including both spot transactions and forward transactions) with National Bank of

The Manager has implemented policies and procedures to make sure that the conditions applicable to each of the above transactions are met. The applicable standing instructions require that these transactions be carried out in accordance with NBII policies, which specify, in particular, that investment decisions pertaining to these related party transactions must be made free from any influence by an entity related to NBII and without taking into account any consideration relevant to an entity related to NBII. Furthermore, the investment decisions must represent the business judgment of the securities advisor, uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interest of the Fund and must achieve a fair and reasonable result for the Fund.

Registered Plan Trust Services

NTC receives a fixed amount per registered account for services provided as trustee for registered plans.

Administrative and Operating Services

The provision of certain services was delegated by the Fund Manager, NBII, to National Bank Trust Inc. ("NBT"), a wholly-owned indirect subsidiary of the Bank. These include accounting, reporting and portfolio valuation services. The fees incurred for these services are paid to NBT by the Fund manager.

Management Fees

The Fund pays annual management fees to the Fund manager for its management services. The fees are calculated based on a percentage of the Fund's daily net asset value before applicable taxes and are paid on a monthly basis. Under the *Distribution* heading, expenses include the broker's compensation consisting of the maximum annual trailer fees and sales commissions paid to brokers. Under the *Other* heading, the fees relate mainly to investment management, investment advisory services, general administration and profit. The breakdown of major services provided in consideration of the management fees, expressed as an approximate percentage of the management fees is as follows:


Past Performance




Annual Returns
